

Mahmoud Labib El-Bokl, New Light on the Archive of Teōs son of Horos from Tuna el-Gebel Necropolis (191-162 BC).

In November 1954, the archaeological mission of Cairo University in Tuna el- Gebel discovered, under the direction of Zaki Aly, a collection of papyri in two jars under the floor of a house in the necropolis (later designated as TG2002.K3). This archive belonged to Teōs son of Horos, who was probably the last keeper of the archive. It includes 15 papyri consisting of ten demotic papyri, four bilingual demotic-Greek papyri, and one Greek papyrus.
